"ONE YEAR TO LIVE" BRINGS NEW LIFE

Like many congregations, ours had a men's group. It wasn't much, and it had come and gone over the previous decade. We tried an evening group, and sometimes there was only one man there. We tried a morning group with little success. We thought about Saturday morning pancake breakfasts with speakers, but it just never seemed to happen. We had a vision of committed men who were really going deeper with

themselves and with God, but we didn't know how to get there.

Finding a starting point

Then we heard about the One Year to Live retreat. With little information in-hand and a bit of mystery surrounding it, we decided to give it a try. We cajoled the seven men from our Tuesday morning men's group to sign up. None of us really knew what to expect of the retreat or the weeks, months and years that followed it, but we took that uncertain step together.

From the moment we arrived at the retreat we were led through a series of experiences designed to ease the stress of our daily lives, help us reflect on the events that shaped us, learn about each other, and take a bold step into the future. There wasn't a lot of preaching yet we were spiritually filled. We had no contact

with our families yet we felt closer to them than we had in years. By the end, we were exhausted.

After the retreat, our small group of men embarked on the 12-session follow-up work. While it is designed to meet once per week for 12 weeks, we found that it took us nearly a year to complete because of scheduling and other issues. During that time we discovered our true "band

of brothers." Through the common bond of the OYTL retreat, plus the ongoing work in our small group, we each gained new brothers that we could lean on in times of trouble and celebrate with in times of joy. Instead of standing around after church with our hands in our pockets waiting for our wives to finish chatting, we were the ones laughing, hugging and sharing until we were the last ones out the door.

In the years since that first retreat, we have had a retreat at least once a year and added dozens more men to our band of brothers. From the uncertain beginning of that retreat, we have moved forward with the vision of men who know Christ and are experiencing a deeper faith with other men by their side. We look forward to including more men, and inviting other congregations and denominations to join us – we are alive!

If your men's group could use new life or if your own spiritual, family or work life could use a boost, then go on a One Year to Live retreat. You may be surprised at what the future holds.

MEANINGFUL RELATIONSHIPS ALL AROUND US

Many people may not be aware that in the past year, my wife and I brought two adopted children into our family. They were adopted from Ethiopia and have been a blessing. They increased

our household to a total of five girls – that's a whole separate article! While on paternity leave and dealing the adoption processes, my wife and I spent this past July in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia.

I was technically off work, but I can never really separate from my interest in faith, ministry and relationships. Purposefully, I wanted to observe and take note of men's relationships outside of the United States. Were there subtle differences in how they interact and include one another? What nuances were the same regardless of borders?

First I noticed that no one treats the other like a stranger. Everyone we encountered was open to giving directions or offering a smile. There also seemed to be a completely different level of physical comfort and contact. Men of all ages would walk down the road and have their arm around the shoulder of the man next to him. Or when crossing a congested street they would hold hands in reassurance that the other was safely crossing.

Then there were the two young men that were asking for handouts in the thick log-jam of cars. The younger one, probably around 12 years old, had leprosy. His hands and feet were darkened and disfigured from the disease. The older boy was carrying him piggy-back style from car to car. They had concluded that working together was to the advantage of both of them.

One individual that we had met during our two previous trips was a fun-loving, quirky taxi driver named Begde (Bugadoo). I never wanted him to feel like just a taxi driver when he was with us. If we stopped to eat during our day trips and he was our driver, he was

asked to eat with us. This showing of appreciation quickly turned into a strong friendship. Bugadoo didn't own his Toyota van, but drove for the owner and had to give some of his fares to him. To keep the owner happy, impress riders and to take pride in his vehicle he would wash it frequently. When he came to our Guest House he knew he had access to water. Bugadoo quickly learned that if I was around I would jump in and help wash the van. This is where our deeper bond was created. We joked that we were,

> area. The majority of the country is Orthodox Christian, and Bugadoo was as well. He felt honored to escort us through a couple of the Orthodox churches. The photo included is of us standing in front of a sculpture of the first archbishop of Addis Ababa.

> After a month in Ethiopia we were so ready to be home with all our girls. However, that meant leaving some very close friends. They had a party for us on the last day, with a barbecue, music and dancing. Bugadoo showed up in his celebration attire. This included a knitted hat and scarf. Toward the end of the night, he put the scarf around my neck and told me never to forget him. Here was a man who lives day-by-day and has but a few changes of clothes giving me a valued possession. I took off my Jerusalem cross pendant from our One Year to Live retreats and gave it to Bugadoo. If you've been to OYTL, you know how important this pendant is, and I thought I would never give it away. In the photo I am explaining the crosses and sharing the meaning it has for me. Bugadoo now wears it, and I hope he never forgets his significance to me.

These types of relationships are happening all around us. They can be so meaningful and fulfilling in our lives. I encourage you to look at what Lutheran Men in Mission is offering around the country that promotes spiritually strong men. Attend a One Year to Live retreat and find a new band of brothers. Attend a workshop and learn about some of our many resources. 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Tools for moving forward in men's ministry

"How can I get a men's group started at my church?" "A couple of guys want to get together but we don't know what to do, please help us." "Do you have anything that I can use to start a men's ministry at my church?"

These are examples of questions that we get from guys who have a desire to get something going at their congregation but are unsure of where to start or how to begin. I wish that I could say that there is a simple, straightforward answer. Unfortunately there is not one. The good news is that we have two resources which address these questions and provide a

process to follow to establish an effective men's ministry.

The first resource is the 32-page Men's Ministry Leaders Supplement found in the front of the *Master Builder Bible for Men* (2nd edition). It outlines step-by-step planning, foundation blocks for men's ministry, the role of a leadership team, a sample survey, event planning helps and checklist, and a recommended time line. It also includes other helpful hints on creating an effective, small group ministry for men.

The second resource is our Building Men for Christ workshop. This is an 8-hour event that explores why men's ministry is important and describes the five different types of men that are in a typical congregation. It uses the concept of a conveyor belt driven by a "create, capture, and sustain" engine to visually show how to move guys along a path to ultimately create disciples. It also describes different types of events that can be effective ways to appeal to each of the five types of men.

The original workshop was based on the book *No Man Left Behind: How to Build and Sustain a Thriving, Disciple Making Ministry for Every Man in Your Church* and its associated training event developed by the Man in the Mirror organization.

We have significantly updated it to include results of LMM's research and experiences. Please note that the workshop is most



effective when attended by several guys from a congregation.

Since its first offering five years ago, we have conducted it all over the country with about 400 men and women (some of our biggest supporters are women pastors) participating. We have leaders from around the country who can conduct the workshop, and we would love to do one in your area. No area is too far for us; we have committed to conduct the workshop in Anchorage, Alaska, in June 2015! For more details on the workshop, please go to *lutheranmeninmission.org* > *Events* > *Building Men for Christ.*

We are also exploring conducting periodic webinars to provide a forum for men to share their ideas and experiences with other men. While we are not yet ready to announce any dates or times, stay tuned as our plans continue to evolve.

The vision of Lutheran Men in Mission is "for every man to become a bold, daring follower of Jesus Christ." We see the Men's Ministry Leaders Supplement and the Building Men for Christ workshop as important resources to realize this vision.
